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
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About the Founder Chairman



Late Shri Gajanand Palriwala



Born on 22nd April, 1926 in Lachhmangarh, a small town in Sikar district of Rajasthan, Gajanand Palriwala joined his family business at the age of 17. By his sheer hard work, he learnt the trade, built up the family enterprise and came to manage a number of companies.

As he withdrew from business, he established the Seth Madanlall Palriwala Foundation (SMPF) of which he was founder-chairman. His vision in setting up the SMPF was to be able to support social welfare and empowerment programmes for youth, women, and the underprivileged as well as projects that enabled environmental development, across the country, but also in the region of his family's origins.



Late Shri Gourishankar Palriwala

Late Shri Gourishankar Palriwala, the elder brother of Shri Gajanand Palriwala, was also a symbol of courage and will power, a visionary and a philantrophist. At a very young age, Gourishankar Palriwala fell ill with polio that left him diff erently abled physically. This did not hold him back, not least through the support he received from his younger brother, Gajanand Palriwala. After completing his college education, he entered the family business, later travelled to the USA, and there took the family enterprise to new heights. He strongly believed that their financial success must be returned to society, through activities to enable the welfare and development of the poor and the underprivileged. Hence, he ploughed most of the earnings and profit into charitable foundations tasked to do so. However, his health did not allow him to pursue his vision.

Though his activities in educational philantropy were long standing, Shri Gajanand Palriwala spent the last two decades of his life in trying to make his own and his elder brother's vision into a reality. Most of the **fi**nancial support to the Palriwala Educational Research and Training Society (PERTS) continues to be provided by the Seth Madanlall Palriwala Foundation (SMPF).



Our Context

The people of Sikar District, Rajasthan, India are in the midst of a search for transformation with a younger generation aspiring to improve their economic situation and searching for new ways to do so.

Family-household based enterprises and incomes from agriculture, animal husbandry, and trade have for some time been insufficient to sustain daily needs for much of the local populace, leave aside new aspirations, resulting in a demand for jobs beyond these sectors.

The youth in the community are facing various problems:

- High levels of youth underemployment, including long-term underemployment.
- Insecurity of income and low earnings.
- High aspirations for employment in government jobs and local trades as sources of security and status.
- Inadequate opportunities for vocational education and training.
- Changes in the role of the family as a vehicle for shared responsibility and socialization of youth.
- Lack of opportunity for young people to participate in the life of society and contribute to its development and well-being.

Freeships

To encourage young women, we provide freeships in specific courses, equal to 25% - 50% of the total training fee depending on their **fi**nancial backgrounds.

Free transportation

We offer free transportation facilities to women students, to-and-from the institutes within the town of Lachhmangarh.

Sports

We organise sports competitions as a platform for the youth of the surrounding areas to enhance their talents and skills in sports such as volleyball, kabaddi, athletics, and badminton.

Cultural Activities

We organise competitions in debates, essay writing, singing, dancing, rangoli making, mehandi, and painting.

Post training support system

Post completion of training courses, we help our students with employment opportunities including self employment by arranging campus placement, recruitment fair, loan fair, etc.

Success Stories of our Trainees

Most of our students of both the institutes, after completion of their training, have become successful to start earning their livelihood by starting self employment, employments in government departments, private enterprises and elsewhere in India and abroad. It gives us immense pleasure to share some of the success stories of the alumni of our PVTRI and PITC as follows:



Preeti could not continue in school after Grade X due to the economic condition of her family and her frail health. After a one-year gap, She joined the Diesel Mechanic course at PITC. After successful completion of her course, she is working as sales and service adviser in a TVS Motors dealership and is supporting her family **fi**nancially.

Subhash is from rural Lachhmangarh and his family is in agriculture. Upon successful completion of the Electrician course from PITC, Subhash who was a topper of the **fi**rst batch of PITC in 2010, succeeded in his attempt in government recruitment examinations in 2011 and is now in government service.

Jitendra was a bus driver and joined the Diesel Mechanic course in PITC. He now has his own Two-Wheeler Repairing Workshop at Lachhmangarh and is earning more than Rs. 20,000/- per month.

Maina is from Churu and her father is a mason, whose earnings are low. Maina joined the PVTRI Beautician course and has now started her own beauty parlour at Churu with earnings of more than Rs. 10,000/- per month

Phool Chand was successfully trained as a Diesel Mechanic. Thereafter, he completed the diploma course in electrical engineering and started his own business for installation and supply of solar panels. His monthly earnings have already crossed Rs. 30,000/-.

Anuj trained in singing and music at PVTRI. He has participated in various state level music and singing competitions and won the prestigious 'Rajasthan Idol' award in 2013. Laxmi is from a poor family. She successfully completed her training in Tailoring (stitching) trade from PVTRI and started tailoring at home. She is now **fi**nancially independent and earns Rs. 7,000/- per month.

After completing his graduation, Vikas desired to learn about computers and joined training in our COPA trade. On completing his training, he started his business as an authorized dealer for E-mitra to provide digital and online services at Lachhmangarh to various government agencies. His present monthly income is more than Rs. 35,000/-.

He is the son of a Motor cycle Mechanic and of a middle class family. He learned basic singing at PVTRI and further polished his singing skills on his own.
